EARLY LITERACY TIP

Letter Knowledge

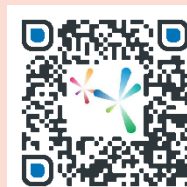
Letter knowledge is the knowledge that letters are different from each other and beginning to learn letter names and sounds. In order to read, children will need to know that letters look different and have different meanings from each other. To strengthen this skill: notice different types of letters (upper and lower case in books), read ABC books, talk about and draw the letters in our child's name.



CLEL BELLS

Books that demonstrate early literacy.

The shortlist presents the top 5 titles in each early literacy practice. This shortlist of 25 CLEL Bell titles presents five top titles for each early literacy practice – READ, WRITE, TALK, SING and PLAY – which collectively encompass an engaging set of books that will support the varied needs and interests of children ages 0-5. EARLY LIT AT HOME ACTIVITIES

Vocabulary:

Did you know that a picture book has three times more rare words than everyday conversation? The more books you read at home, the more your child's vocabulary will expand. When you read together ask open-ended questions.

Introducing new words

If you introduce a new word, make sure you explain what it means. When you have conversations, make sure that you leave space for your child to respond. Give them some time to respond. As children are learning to communicate, they need time to process a question, formulate a response, and to verbalize that response.
