EARLY LITERACY TIP

Talk

Babbles are the first step to talking. When your child babbles at you, engage with them. You can have conversations before your little one even learns how to talk in full sentences! As you go throughout your day, talk about what is going on around you. "We are at the library, which is filled with books. We got here by driving in our car." The more words your little one hears, the greater their vocabulary becomes.

Phonological Awareness:



As your little one is learning words, an important aspect is how words interact with each other. Play rhyming games with your little one. Rhyming helps break down the sounds in words.

ACTIVITIES AT HOME

Talk

Talking about print helps children understand that there is a meaning to print. Point out letters and language all around you. Think about all the things that have letters other than books: road signs, cereal boxes, and all sorts of other items!

Vocabulary

When your child talks to you, engage with them in an open-ended conversation. Explain the meaning of new words that they might learn. Slow down your speech. Your little



one is always learning, and the more time they can absorb words, the greater their vocabulary will be.
